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INTRODUCTION: EU AND HR IN EXTERNAL RELATIONS

- EU promoter of Human rights in its external relations
- Legal basis
 - Article 2 TEU: EU values: « The Union is founded on the values of respect for human dignity, freedom, democracy, equality, the rule of law and respect for human rights, including the rights of persons belonging to minorities. These values are common to the Member States in a society in which pluralism, non-discrimination, tolerance, justice, solidarity and equality between women and men prevail. »
 - Article 3 TEU: objectives of the EU « 5. In its relations with the wider world, the Union shall uphold and promote its values and interests and contribute to the protection of its citizens. It shall contribute to peace, security, the sustainable development of the Earth, solidarity and mutual respect among peoples, free and fair trade, eradication of poverty and the protection of human rights, in particular the rights of the child, as well as to the strict observance and the development of international law, including respect for the principles of the United Nations Charter. »

INTRODUCTION: EU AND HR IN EXTERNAL RELATIONS

- Legal basis
 - Article 21 TEU: (The Union's action on the international scene shall be guided by the principles which have inspired its own creation, development and enlargement, and which it seeks to advance in the wider world: democracy, the rule of law, the universality and indivisibility of human rights and fundamental freedoms, respect for human dignity, the principles of equality and solidarity, and respect for the principles of the United Nations Charter and international law.)

INTRODUCTION - EU'S ACTION - HR ON THE INTERNATIONAL SCENE

- EU Action Plan on Human Rights and Democracy 2020-2024
 - Ambitions and priorities :
 - protecting and empowering individuals,
 - building resilient, inclusive and democratic societies
 - Promoting a global system for human rights and democracy, etc.
- Political dialogues with ≈ 60 countries
- Trade agreements = human rights clause as "essential element".
 Can lead to the imposition of measures (e. g. suspension of cooperation in case of HR violation)
- Regulation 2020/1998 establishing a global human rights sanction regime
- Etc.

INTRODUCTION: EU AND SOUTH-EAST ASIA

- Bilateral and bi-regional relations
 - ASEAN = Association of Southeast Asian Nations
- Long standing cooperation focused on trade
 - Bilateral FTA
 - Vietnam (EVFTA) = in force in 2020
 - Singapore (EUSFTA) = in force in 2019
 - Failure to reach an EU-ASEAN FTA (for now)
 - EU-ASEAN air transport agreement in 2022
- How about Human rights?

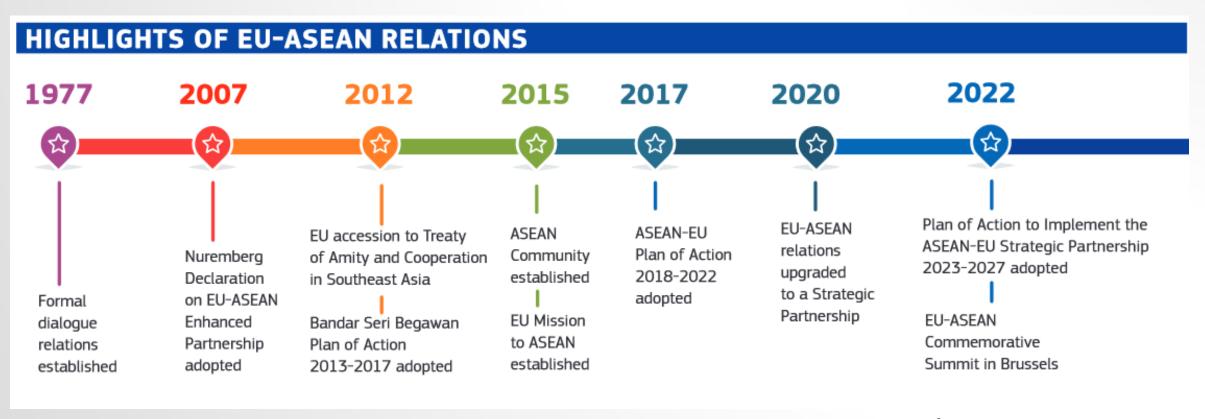

EARLY EU-ASEAN COOPERATION

- Early 70's = dialogue
 - ASEAN established as a bulwark against communism fosters relationship with EEC
 - Common adversary political interest of the EEC influence USA/USSR
 - Access to ASEAN markets
 - 1980 = Cooperation Agreement between EEC-ASEAN member States
 - Development, commerce, economic and cultural development
 - ASEAN mostly a recipient of EU donations
 - Democracy and human rights played a marginal role

LONG STALLED RELATION BECAUSE OF HR ISSUES

- 1990's = after end of Cold war, shift in EC's stands towards ASEAN
 - Required HR and democracy clauses in EC/EU-ASEAN cooperation agreements
 - Policy of conditionnalities = aid and trade linked to HR
 - 1995 = EU established a policy of systematically including HR clauses in its new trade agreements
 - Unacceptable for ASEAN countries = interference / narrative of « Asian values » (work, frugality) vs individualism, eurocentrism, universalism
- Myanmar/Burma situation
 - EU sanctions on Myanmar since 1991 to promote democracy and HR
 - Accepted in ASEAN in 1997 no interference in internal affairs
 - Impaired interregional relations
 - EU-ASEAN meetings suspended for +2 years

2000'S: RESUMING EU-ASEAN RELATIONS

- Ministerial meeting resumed in 2000
- EU Strategy « Europe and Asia » september 2001
 - « work together with Asia to uphold the universality and indivisibility of human rights »
- Ease of ASEAN's position on integration process understanding
 - ASEAN Charter in 2007 = inspired by the EU Treaties
 - Assistance of EU officials to draft the Charter
- EU-ASEAN Nuremberg declaration of 15 March 2007 on an EU-ASEAN Enhanced Partnership
 - Commitment on promoting HR: « Recognizing the need to strengthen the promotion and the protection of human rights through practical steps and closer cooperation, including in international fora »

NEW GEOPOLITICAL CONTEXT = A NEW IMPETUS IN EU-ASEAN RELATIONS

- China's influence
 - Influence in ASEAN
 - RCEP
 - BRI
 - Dependency?
 - De-risking policy of the EU
 - « systemic rival »
- Middle powers in the USA/China rivalry
 - « Asean Centrality »
 - EU = access to ASEAN markets
- => New impetus in EU/ASEAN relations

NEW IMPETUS IN EU-ASEAN COOPERATION IN THE FIELD OF HUMAN RIGHTS

2020 = Strategic Partnership

- « today we elevated the ASEAN-EU Dialogue Partnership to a Strategic Partnership »
- « We also reaffirmed the importance of maintaining and promoting peace, security, stability, safety, and freedom of navigation in and overflight above the South China Sea »

• 2022 = Commemorative Summit Joint Statement :

« ASEAN and the EU are strategic partners with a shared interest in a
peaceful, stable and prosperous region, where international law and the
rules-based international order are respected and upheld, and where
peace, security and stability are maintained, including through, among
others, the promotion and protection of human rights such as gender
equality and fundamental freedoms »



FOSTERED BY A RECENT ASEAN COMMITMENT TOWARDS FUNDAMENTAL RIGHTS

- ASEAN Human rights declaration 2012 ASEAN Summit Phnom Penh
 - Civil and political rights
 - Economic, Social and Cultural rights
 - Right to development
 - Right to peace
- ASEAN Intergovernmental Commission on Human Rights (AICHR) in 2009
 - « to promote and protect human rights and fundamental freedoms of the peoples of ASEAN »
 - One representative nominated from each ASEAN Member State

HR CLAUSES IN EU FTA

• EU-Vietnam FTA in force since 2020:

Chapter XIII « Trade and sustainable development »

- Article 13.1: « The objective of this Chapter is to promote sustainable development, notably by fostering the contribution of trade and investment related aspects of labour and environmental issues »
- Article 13.4: « 2. Each Party reaffirms its commitments, in accordance with its obligations under the ILO and the ILO Declaration on Fundamental Principles and Rights at Work and its Follow-up, adopted by the International Labour Conference at its 86th Session in 1998, to respect, promote and effectively implement the principles concerning the fundamental rights at work, namely:
- (a) the **freedom of association** and the effective recognition of the **right to** collective bargaining;
- (b) the elimination of all forms of forced or compulsory labour;
- (c) the effective abolition of child labour; and
- (d) the elimination of discrimination in respect of employment and occupation.
- Similar provisions in **EU-Singapore** FTA in force since 2019

EU FUNDING - DEVELOPMENT AID

- Example « Safe and Fair : Realising women migrant worker's rights and opportunities in the ASEAN »
- Jan 2018 Dec. 22
- € 25 million by the EU
- Information campaing to raise awareness on violence, trafficking on women migrant workers

SAFE & FAIR:

Realizing women migrant workers' rights and opportunities in the ASEAN region









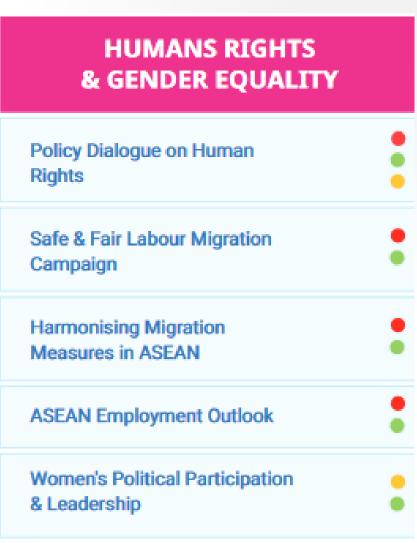


- 700 people trained on gender-based violence
- · Support to elaboration of policy-recommendation, etc.

- Enhanced Regional EU-ASEAN Dialogue Instrument
- Programme that facilitates EU-ASEAN dialogue fora
- Supports ASEAN integration reducing poverty
- 2017-2025 : €20 million by the EU
- Several sectors:
 - Connectivity
 - Environment
 - HR
 - · reasearch...

EU FUNDING - DEVELOPMENT AID

- Supporting to AICHR Asean Inter-governmental Commission on HR
- € 600 000 2024-2025
- To contribute to fostering a culture of respect, protection, and promotion of human rights in ASEAN countries
 - Strengthen capacity and expertise of AICHR in promoting and protecting HR
 - Strengthen the networking of AICHR with the EU and civil society



II. REMAINING CHALLENGES



ASEAN HUMAN RIGHTS DECLARATION: WEAKNESSES (1/2)

- ASEAN Human Rights Declaration :
 - « ASEAN Member States share a common interest in and commitment to the promotion and protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms which shall be achieved through, inter alia, cooperation with one another as well as with relevant national, regional and international institutions/organisations, in accordance with the ASEAN Charter »
 - « Nothing in this Declaration may be interpreted as implying for any State, group or person any right to perform any act aimed at undermining the purposes and principles of ASEAN »
 - Primacy of other ASEAN principles: ASEAN Charter: art. 2: principle of respect for «
 the independence, sovereignty, equality, territorial integrity and national identity of
 all ASEAN Member States" and "non-interference" in internal affairs
 - « the realisation of human rights must be considered in the regional and national context bearing in mind different political, economic, legal, social, cultural, historical and religious backgrounds » = prominence of national particularities over human rights standards

ASEAN HUMAN RIGHTS DECLARATION: WEAKNESSES (2/2)

- Criticisms from UN experts when declaration launched
 - Concern on affirmation: « The enjoyment of human rights and fundamental freedoms must be balanced with the performance of corresponding duties as every person has responsibilities to all other individuals ». Not in line with International Human Rights Law
 - Expert: « Insufficient input from civil society and other stakeholders »
- Also criticized by NGOs (Amnesty international, etc).
 - Sub-standard level of rights = diluted version of HR than UN
- Lack of provisions on freedom of association, or minorities rights, for example

ASEAN INTERGOVERNMENTAL COMMISSION ON HUMAN RIGHTS: WEAKNESSES

- Operates by consensus
- In accordance with ASEAN fundamental principles:
 - Sovereignty, territorial integrity
 - non-interference in domestic affairs
- Not comparable to the CJEU or ECHR

EU's « normative power » ≠ « ASEAN way »

HR VIOLATIONS IN ASEAN MEMBER STATES – A FEW EXAMPLES

- Little positive impact of ASEAN HR declaration
 - Vietnam
 - Excessive use of force by the police
 - Torture in prisons and death penalty (number of execution State secret)
 - Detention of peaceful activists Communist State

Thailand

- Prohibition of « lèse-majesté » in Criminal Code Monarchy Imprisonment
- Constitutional Court, 31 Jan. 24 = Contrary to the Constitution to propose to repeal it

Philippines :

- « illiberal populism » with Rodrigo Duterte between 2016-22
- Controversial measures against drug trafficking: order to shoot to kill
- 2022 EP resolution condemning the thousands of extrajudicial executions

Myanmar

- Military junta repression of political opposition from detention to death penalty
- Armed conflits lead to forced displacement of civilians
- Forced displacement/persecutions of Rohyngias

EU'S UNILATERAL ACTIONS AGAINST HR VIOLATION

Sanctions against Myanmar

- Sanction since 1991
- Then dialogue once democracry re-established in 2015
 - Legislative elections Aung San Suu Kyi State counsellor / foreign Minister
 - Persecution of Rohyngya people since 2017 800 000 fled to Bangladesh
 - Feb. 2021: coup military seized power -detained Aung San Suu Kyi
 - « human rights abyss » according to UN report
 - At least 2414 civilans killed April 23 June 24
 - 3 million people displaced
- Asean's powerlessness

8 packages of sanctions since military coup

- Travel ban on individuals (103 individuals)
- Asset freeze for individuals and entities
- Arms embargo
- Export ban on equipment usable for repression or to monitor intercept internet/phone communication
- · Etc.
- => also sanctions against **Cambodia** in 2020



INTERNAL LEGISLATION OF THE EU

- Directive on corporate sustainability due diligence (<u>Directive</u> 2024/1760) in force since 25 July 2024
 - Imposes EU importers to carry out environmental and human rights due diligence throughout their supply chain
 - First target: China and forced labour of Uyghur population in Xinjiang
 - Potential effect on textile industry in Vietnam, Malaysia, Cambodia and wooden/rubber produced in Indonesia
- Forced labour regulation approved by EP in April 2024
 - Prohibition of imports, exports and sales of products made with forced labour
 - Will it affect ASEAN countries?
- EU Deforestation regulation in force in Dec. 24
 - Palm oil conflict Indonesia/Malaysia
 - Environment/social rights = affect economic rights of palm oil sector workers?

CONCLUSION:

HR AND DEMOCRACY IN THE EU: A BLOW TO THE EU'S CREDIBILITY?

- Erosion of democracy and HR protection
 - Rule of law crisis
 - Poland, Hungary
 - Rise of far right
 - Italy
 - France
 - Germany = Thüringen
- Credibility of the EU as a HR protector
- Ability to speak for all its Member States questioned
